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<p>B. <u>2012-2025 Annual Bicycle and Pedestrian Data Report</u> – Peter Mohr, WAMPO <i>WAMPO's annual bicycle and pedestrian counts, conducted since 2012, offer crucial insights into nonmotorized travel trends in the region. The data help to inform road improvements and nonmotorized transportation projects. They enhance public understanding of travel patterns, physical activity, and interactions with the transportation system. Of the forty (40) locations planned for counting in 2025, at least one two-hour count was completed at thirty-eight (38) locations. Twenty-six (26) of those sites had at least one weekday and one weekend count performed, which allows for the meaningful estimation of Annual Average Daily Traffic (AADT) at that location. These data and estimates are detailed in the 2012-2025 Annual Bicycle and Pedestrian Data Report.</i></p>	<p>16 to 19</p>

C. Director's Report

i. **Bimonthly TIP Project Statuses**

Peter Mohr, WAMPO, explained that the WAMPO Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) Policy includes a Reasonable Progress Policy, under which projects programmed to receive WAMPO-suballocated funding that are scheduled to start in the current Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) or that have started but not finished (including projects that started in prior FFYs) are to have progress reports every two months. The TIP Project Statuses report for October 2025 was shared.

Mr. Mohr reported that all projects programmed in the TIP to obligate WAMPO suballocated funds during Federal Fiscal Year 2025 (FFY2025, October 1, 2024-September 30, 2025) did so before the end of FFY2025, then he pointed out the projects programmed to obligate WAMPO suballocated and non-suballocated funds during FFY2026.

ii. **Request for Proposals (RFP) Updates**

Mr. Mohr provided an update on recent WAMPO Requests for Proposals (RFPs). For the Regional Active Transportation Plan, a consultant has been selected and a contract is under negotiation, which is anticipated to be presented to the TPB for approval on November 18, 2025. The Household Travel Survey RFP closed September 26, 2025; three (3) proposals were received. A consultant selection committee is reviewing the Household Travel Survey proposals and interviews with the consultants who submitted them are scheduled through mid-November.

iii. **Draft 2026 WAMPO Meeting Schedule**

Markey Jonas, WAMPO, discussed the draft 2026 WAMPO meeting schedule. Before the end of each calendar year, WAMPO develops and distributes board and committee meeting schedules for the upcoming year. In the draft 2026 meeting schedule, all but one of the proposed meeting dates are consistent with the usual patterns for each board/committee: the exception is that the May 2026 TAC meeting is proposed to be held one week earlier than usual, on the third Monday of the month (May 18, 2026), in order to not conflict with Memorial Day. Additionally, there will not be a January 2026 TPB meeting.

iv. **Coordinated Public Transit-Human Services Transportation Plan Administrative Adjustment**

Ms. Jonas provided notice of an Administrative Adjustment to the WAMPO Coordinated Public Transit-Human Services Transportation Plan (CPT-HSTP), which is a tool to help the community coordinate transportation programs for older adults, people with disabilities,

and low-income households within the WAMPO region. In light of new USDOT guidance with implications for the contents of MPO planning documents, WAMPO staff have processed an administrative adjustment to the CPT-HSTP to ensure it complies with the guidance. Since only minor language changes were made, a formal amendment process was not required. The post-administrative-adjustment CPT-HSTP is available on the WAMPO public transit webpage, www.wampo.org/public-transit.

v. Safe Routes to School (SRTS) Update

Mr. Mohr presented an animated map showcasing locations where WAMPO staff and consultants have conducted school walk audits across the region as part of the regional Safe Routes to School (SRTS) planning project and provided an overview of walk audit logistics.

Kim Negrete, WAMPO, provided additional information on activities related to the SRTS planning project. Fall 2025 data collection efforts are in progress, including a parent/caregiver survey, Student Travel Tallies, and walk audits at each participating school, which WAMPO is working with consultants, school contacts, local government staff, and other partners to conduct during October-November 2025; additional volunteers to help conduct the walk audits are still needed. WAMPO staff have attended several fall festivals to increase awareness and engage the public in SRTS efforts. The next SRTS Stakeholder Meeting will be November 17, 2025, at 10:00 AM.

A. 2025 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) Amendment 2

Ms. Jonas asked the TAC to make a recommendation to the TPB on proposed Amendment 2 to the 2025 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP). The UPWP outlines WAMPO's transportation planning activities and tasks to be undertaken throughout the year. Proposed 2025 UPWP Amendment 2 would adjust allocations between staff tasks, decrease overall operating and consultant-supported project expenditures to reflect completed work and revised work schedules, and account for the removal of a sub-task to purchase data. Draft 2025 UPWP Amendment 2 was available for public comment October 10-October 24, 2025; no public comments were received.

B. 2026 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP)

Ms. Jonas asked the TAC to make a recommendation to the TPB on the proposed 2026 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP). The UPWP outlines WAMPO's transportation planning activities and tasks to be undertaken throughout the year. The draft 2026 UPWP continues projects and activities outlined in the 2025 UPWP and was available for public comment September 12-October 12, 2025. No public comments were received.

Discussion:

Mr. Janzen asked about the Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) demonstration grant awarded to WAMPO and whether there were any updates, sharing that the City of Wichita submitted an application for an implementation grant over the summer and expressing concern that the funds from the demonstration grant have not yet been received. Ms. Jonas and Ms. Negrete shared that WAMPO is working with the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) on a grant agreement and that the agreement process for implementation grants is often faster than for demonstration grants.

Mr. Janzen asked for additional details about the Regional Active Transportation Plan, and Mr. Mohr explained that it will include an inventory of existing bicycle and pedestrian facilities and how they connect communities in the region, as well as recommendations for projects to improve connectivity.

Mr. Janzen inquired about the next steps in the regional Safe Routes to School (SRTS) planning initiative and about whether there was identified funding for projects. Ms. Negrete responded that, after the school walk audits, WAMPO will discuss the observations from the walk audits with city and county engineers to get their reviews and suggestions before sharing reports with the schools. Chad Parasa, WAMPO, explained that potential funding sources for SRTS-related projects will be identified in the SRTS plans. School districts and local governments will be better positioned to apply for funding once SRTS plans are in place.

Steve Degenhardt asked about the development of the FFY2027-FFY2030 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). Ms. Jonas and Nick Flanders, WAMPO, shared that it will be developed in 2026, before the start of FFY2027, and that most of the new projects awarded funding during the process will be programmed to receive it in FFY2029 and FFY2030. Additional details will be shared in early 2026.

Matt Baker, JEO, gave a presentation on the draft updated regional ITS architecture. Mr. Mohr asked the TAC to make a recommendation to the Transportation Policy Body (TPB) on whether to approve the draft updated regional ITS architecture, which includes an inventory of current ITS infrastructure and a detailed examination of future deployment plans, informed by extensive regional stakeholder engagement. The draft ITS architecture has been reviewed by Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) staff, whose feedback has been addressed to their satisfaction in the draft ITS architecture and supporting documentation, which are available for public comment October 18-November 16, 2025.

Mr. Mohr explained that in 2022, as a resource for communities throughout the region, WAMPO staff used satellite imagery to create a detailed GIS map layer of known sidewalks, crosswalks, and multiuse paths within the bounds of the Metropolitan Planning Area (MPA). During February-October 2025, WAMPO staff updated that GIS map layer using more recent satellite imagery.

Executive Summary

To enhance communication and collaboration across the metropolitan area, WAMPO is coordinating a series of presentations with the theme of “Regional Connections.” This initiative invites WAMPO jurisdictions to present on local projects, policies, or programs to the Transportation Policy Body (TPB). The goal of this presentation series is to keep stakeholders informed about new and ongoing efforts and encourage an integrated approach to planning.

Background

The Wichita Area Metropolitan Planning Organization's (WAMPO's) planning boundary encompasses a complex and varied network of jurisdictions, each contributing to the success of the region. To enhance communication and collaboration across the metropolitan area, WAMPO is coordinating a series of presentations to the Transportation Policy Body (TPB) with the theme of “Regional Connections.” This initiative invites WAMPO jurisdictions and planning partners to present updates on local projects, policies, or programs of regional significance. The presentation series is meant to ensure stakeholders stay informed about new and ongoing work across the region and highlights initiatives within each community.

The goals of the Regional Connections presentation series include, among other things:

- » Facilitating information exchange – Provide a forum to share updates on transportation, infrastructure, and planning initiatives.
- » Enhancing regional understanding – Highlight how individual projects and programs contribute to regional mobility, economic development, and overall quality of life.
- » Encouraging collaboration – Strengthen partnership among jurisdictions and promote a coordinated regional approach to transportation planning.

Presentation Format, Topics, & Schedule

The Regional Connections presentations are scheduled at regular TPB meetings (the second Tuesday of every month, at 3:00 PM) and provide an opportunity for WAMPO board and committee members, stakeholders, and the public to engage with planning partners. Presenters include planning, public works, transportation, and other staff from WAMPO member jurisdictions, ensuring a balanced representation of projects and initiatives. The presentation series aims to strengthen regional understanding and encourage dialogue that supports coordinated planning and well-informed decision-making. Presentation topics will be highlighted on the WAMPO website.

Presentations (15 minutes, + or -) from jurisdictions can be subdivided into the following major categories:

1. Growth patterns (population, housing, employment, etc.)
2. Planned transportation improvement projects
3. Regional ties between growth patterns and transportation improvements
4. Other topics of regional significance

Title VI Program Manual and Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Plan Updates

Executive Summary

WAMPO fully complies with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and related statutes and regulations in all programs and activities. This includes ensuring access to programs and services for individuals not proficient in the English language. Last updated in 2022, WAMPO's Title VI Program Manual and Limited English Proficiency (LEP) plan have been updated and reviewed by state and federal planning partners. The TAC is asked to make a recommendation to the TPB on the draft updated Title VI Program Manual and Limited English Proficiency (LEP) plan.

Background

WAMPO assures full compliance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Civil Rights Restoration Act of 1987, and related statutes and regulations in all programs and activities. Title VI, 42 U.S.C. § 2000d et seq., requires that no person in the United States of America shall, on the grounds of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving federal financial assistance. The Civil Rights Restoration Act of 1987 expands this requirement to include all programs and activities offered by any agency receiving federal funding. Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Circular 4702.1B, Title VI Requirements and Guidelines for Federal Transit Administration Recipients, outlines compliance procedures for recipients of FTA-administered program funds. The FTA requires that all funding recipients document compliance by submitting a Title VI Program Manual once every three years. As a funding subrecipient, WAMPO demonstrates Title VI compliance through the Kansas Department of Transportation (KDOT).

Compliance with Title VI includes ensuring access to programs and services for individuals not proficient in the English language. WAMPO's Limited English Proficiency (LEP) plan guides WAMPO to provide meaningful access to the transportation planning process for people with a limited ability to communicate in English. It includes an analysis of the number of LEP individuals in the region, the extent to which LEP individuals participate in WAMPO's processes, the resources WAMPO employs to provide language assistance services, and identification of an appropriate mix of LEP services that WAMPO can make available to ensure access to the transportation planning process.

Last updated in 2022, WAMPO's Title VI Program Manual and Limited English Proficiency (LEP) plan have been updated by WAMPO staff and reviewed by KDOT, FHWA, and FTA staff. WAMPO's legal counsel completed an additional review of both documents to ensure compliance with all regulations.

For all recipients and subrecipients of federal aid, a Title VI Program Manual must be approved by the (sub)recipient's board or other appropriate governing entity or official(s) responsible for policy decisions. The TAC is now asked to make a recommendation to the TPB on the draft updated Title VI Program Manual and Limited English Proficiency (LEP) plan.

Title VI Notice

The Title VI Notice, below, is included in all WAMPO core documents and other significant publications distributed to the public. The Title VI Notice is also displayed in the WAMPO offices, at WAMPO-hosted public meetings, and on the WAMPO Title VI webpage. Title VI Program Manual and Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Plan Updates

The Wichita Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (WAMPO) hereby gives public notice that it is the policy of the agency to assure full compliance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Civil Rights Restoration Act of 1987, and related statutes and regulations in all programs and activities.

Title VI requires that no person in the United States of America shall, on the grounds of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any program or activity under the control of WAMPO. Requests for special accommodation and/or language assistance should be made to wampo@wampo.org or by calling (316) 779-1313 at least 48 hours in advance.

Any person who believes they have been aggrieved by an unlawful discriminatory practice under Title VI has a right to file a formal complaint with WAMPO. Any such complaint must be in writing and filed with WAMPO's Title VI Coordinator within one hundred eighty (180) days following the date of the alleged discriminatory occurrence.

Executive Summary

WAMPO is working with SRF Consulting Group on a regional Safe Routes to School (SRTS) planning initiative to assist local governments and K-12 schools (public and private) with the development of at least sixty (60) school-specific SRTS plans in the region; so far, fifty-four (54) schools have confirmed their participation. Fall 2025 data collection efforts are in progress and include a parent/caregiver survey, Student Travel Tallies, and walk audits at each participating school, which WAMPO is working with consultants, school contacts, local-government staff, and other partners to conduct during October-November 2025. In addition to the school data collection efforts, WAMPO staff have attended several fall festivals to increase awareness and engage the public in SRTS efforts. WAMPO is in discussions with member jurisdictions regarding the provision of local matching funds for the federal funding supporting the SRTS planning initiative.

Background

Safe Routes to School (SRTS) is a national initiative in the United States that aims to improve the safety and accessibility of walking and bicycle routes for students traveling to and from K-12 schools. The program was established in 2005, under the federal transportation legislation known as the Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU). The primary goals of the SRTS program are to promote safety, encourage active transportation, reduce traffic congestion, and create a sense of community. SRTS programs are typically implemented at the state and local levels, in cooperation with schools and school districts.

WAMPO has embarked on an extensive planning process to ensure the successful development of Safe Routes to School plans in the region. WAMPO staff and consultants (SRF Consulting Group, with subconsultants Alta Design and Shockey) are assisting member jurisdictions, their respective school districts, and private schools in the development of SRTS plans.

WAMPO staff and consultants are promoting the initiative at local fall festivals and back-to-school events, collecting school and resident data to inform school-specific plans, identifying additional schools interested in participating, developing a Best Practices Guide, and facilitating the work of the SRTS Stakeholder Committee, which is comprised of local government staff, school/district staff, and representatives of nonprofit organizations. Deliverables over the two-year project period include, among other things, the development of at least sixty (60) school-specific SRTS plans, as well as aiding local governments, school districts, and individual schools in identifying point people and funding opportunities to support ongoing safety efforts.

To date, fifty-four (54) K-12 schools in the WAMPO region have confirmed their participation in this planning effort and will have individualized SRTS plans. An interactive map of those schools can be found at www.wampo.org/srts. More such schools in the region are sought.

SRTS Stakeholder Committee meetings were held in March, April, May, July, September, and November 2025 and included representatives from nine (9) of the fourteen (14) public school districts in the region. The most recent meeting focused on Fall 2025 data-collection initiatives:

- » **Parent/Caregiver Survey** – An online survey (July-November 2025) collected input from parents/caregivers of K-12 students about how their children travel to school, perceived barriers to active transportation, and the locations of bicycle/pedestrian infrastructure issues (as identified on an interactive map). The survey was distributed by schools, local governments, and community partners to ensure broad distribution. 2,267 survey responses, from the parents/caregivers of 3,038 students, have been received. Results are being analyzed and will be shared throughout the SRTS planning process.
- » **Student Travel Tallies** – Student Travel Tallies are being collected by participating schools and include information from students on how they traveled to and from school over a three-day period (Tuesday-Thursday). On each of the three days, teachers ask their students how they traveled to school and how they plan to depart after the school day. Student Travel Tallies are vital to understanding how students travel and are being collected through November 2025.
- » **School Walk Audits** – Small groups of school staff, local-government staff, WAMPO staff, consultants, parents, and/or other interested community partners/volunteers are completing walk audits in the vicinity of each participating school during the peak before- and after-school arrival/departure periods. Walk audits identify safety concerns and potential infrastructure improvements. Walk audits at most participating schools have been completed as of November 2025.

The next SRTS Stakeholder meeting is tentatively scheduled for Monday, January 12, 2026.

The consultant contract for the WAMPO Safe Routes to School planning initiative is for an amount not to exceed \$499,934.50, through December 31, 2026. The federal funds used on this project require a 20% local match (i.e., 80% federal funding, 20% non-federal funding). WAMPO is in discussions with member jurisdictions regarding the provision of local matching funds for the SRTS planning initiative.

Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) and Transportation Policy Body (TPB) members are asked to continue supporting the SRTS initiative by participating in data collection efforts and distributing public communications.

2012-2025 Annual Bicycle and Pedestrian Data Report

Executive Summary

WAMPO's annual bicycle and pedestrian counts, conducted since 2012, offer crucial insights into nonmotorized travel trends in the region. The data help to inform road improvements and nonmotorized transportation projects. They enhance public understanding of travel patterns, physical activity, and interactions with the transportation system. Of the forty (40) locations planned for counting in 2025, at least one two-hour count was completed at thirty-eight (38) locations. Twenty-six (26) of those sites had at least one weekday and one weekend count performed, which allows for the meaningful estimation of Annual Average Daily Traffic (AADT) at those locations. These data and estimates are detailed in the 2012-2025 Annual Bicycle and Pedestrian Data Report.

Background

Since 2012, WAMPO has conducted annual bicycle and pedestrian counts at various locations throughout the region, measuring nonmotorized travel; this helps to discern long-term walking and bicycling trends and inform where emphasis should be placed by member jurisdictions in terms of road improvements, repairs, and new nonmotorized transportation projects. The count results are shared with the public and government agencies and can help communities develop a more thorough understanding of how people in the WAMPO region get from one place to another, stay active, and interact with the transportation system. The resultant data also shed light on the relationship between transportation and land use by illustrating trends in road and path usage.

WAMPO Bicycle and Pedestrian Count Projections

From 2012 to 2022, bicycle riders and pedestrians were counted at forty-two (42) locations each year. In 2023, the set of count locations was adjusted, revising the total downward to thirty-five (35) designated count locations. In 2024, a new count location was added in Bel Aire, for a total of thirty-six (36). In 2025, four (4) new count locations were added in Wichita, for a total of forty (40). For each location, the aim of the study was to conduct counts for two hours on a Wednesday or Thursday morning, two hours on a Wednesday or Thursday evening, and two hours on a Saturday afternoon, for a total of six hours of volunteer time per count location. Data are gathered both at screenlines (a line across a path or road, crossings of which are counted) and at intersections (where passage through the intersection is counted, by direction of approach). WAMPO had support from approximately thirty-five (35) community volunteers in 2025 to collect these data, in addition to WAMPO staff.

During the 2025 bicycle and pedestrian count, WAMPO tested nine (9) MioVision cameras to confirm they operate as desired and to aid in the count. At several count locations, there was both a human counter and a camera to confirm the count data. WAMPO will partner with its member jurisdictions to determine how best the cameras can be utilized to collect data in the future.

WAMPO uses data from limited annual bicycle and pedestrian count periods to estimate nonmotorized Annual Average Daily Traffic (AADT). Count and estimation methods follow the National Bicycle and Pedestrian Documentation Project standards. Of the forty (40) locations planned for counting in 2025, at least

one two-hour count was completed at thirty-eight (38) locations. Twenty-six (26) of those sites had at least one weekday and one weekend count performed, which allows for the meaningful estimation of AADT at those locations.

All bicycle and pedestrian count data, AADT estimates, and analyses are compiled into a comprehensive report, the WAMPO 2012-2025 Annual Bicycle and Pedestrian Data Report. In addition to the report's tables and static maps of the results of the 2025 bicycle and pedestrian count, WAMPO has developed an online, interactive map, accessible through the WAMPO website, that includes past-year and current-year counts and AADT estimates.

Bicycle and Pedestrian AADT Interactive Map Development

Task 4: Create GIS maps illustrating patterns and trends in the data

Task 5: Develop WAMPO 2012-2025 Annual Bicycle and Pedestrian Data Report
