	activity, and transportation interactions. Data from 35 locations in 2023, projected over time, helps							

	predict Average Annual Daily Traffic (AADT) for cyclists and pedestrians based on national	
	standards. WAMPO staff have compiled data, projections, and analyzed demographics to form a	
	comprehensive report, and have developed an interactive map.

	WAMPO maintains a Travel Demand Model (TDM) for the Wichita metropolitan area. The TDM

C. Director's Report

i. MTP/TIP Call for Projects - 9/15/23 - 1/5/24

Chad Parasa, WAMPO, announced that a combined Call for Projects for the Metropolitan Transportation Plan 2050 (MTP 2050) and the FFY2025-FFY2028 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) is open from September 15, 2023, through January 5, 2024.

ii. FFY2024 TIP Projects Status Update

Mr. Parasa explained that the WAMPO Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) Policy includes a Reasonable Progress Policy, under which projects receiving WAMPO suballocated funding in the current Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) or that received it in a past FFY but are not completed are to have bimonthly progress reports to the TAC/TPB.

iii. MTP 2050 Update

Mr. Parasa shared that the first round of public engagement for Metropolitan Transportation Plan 2050 (MTP 2050) was successfully completed over the summer of 2023, and with over 800 respondents. WAMPO's second round of public engagement will begin on December 1, 2023, and will continue through February 29, 2024. This round of engagement will gather input on long-range planning scenarios and allow the public to

choose between different future growth and transportation options. The results from the first round of MTP 2050 public engagement can be viewed at https://www.wampo.org/mtp2050.

iv. Automatic Bike/Ped Counters

Mr. Parasa said that WAMPO has conducted manual bicycle and pedestrian counts for 12 years, facing challenges like volunteer shortages and weather-related data gaps. WAMPO is exploring advanced technology solutions including big data analytics and camera-based systems to improve data-collection accuracy. WAMPO staff plan to issue a Request for Proposals (RFP) for advanced counting technology and select a vendor based on the requirements of accuracy, data integration, and scalability.

v. Kansas Mobility Week - 11/5/23 -11/11/23

Jessica Warren, WAMPO, presented on Kansas's annual statewide Mobility Week, November 5-11, 2023. Kansas Mobility Week is a celebration of making smart, efficient, and safe multimodal public transportation choices. During Kansas Mobility Week, cities, counties, and transportation partner agencies host events to promote transportation choices, highlight transportation achievements, and roll out new initiatives or policies. The statewide event includes a selfie challenge, wherein participants post photos of themselves using public transit on social media with the hashtag #KansasRides2023.

vi. Staff Updates

Mr. Parasa spoke on recent staff updates, introducing new staff members Dani Lasher, Public Outreach Planner, and Markey Jonas, Administrative Assistant.

vii. SRTS Planning Assistance

Mr. Parasa shared that, following advice from the Transportation Policy Body Chair, WAMPO is exploring to see how to include more schools in the region in Safe Routes to School (SRTS) planning. WAMPO staff, in coordination with member jurisdictions and KDOT, are researching how to best find additional funds for a more comprehensive SRTS planning effort.

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3. Public Comments

Alan Kailer, Bike Walk Wichita, shared his thoughts on the Comprehensive Safety Action Plan (CSAP), saying it is a great plan, and staff has done a good job creating it, but it doesn't quite say that safety is a priority. Mr. Kailer stated that, ultimately, what is important is not what is said in the plan but what is done in the project-selection process and emphasized the need to prioritize safety in the selection of projects for funding going forward.

Gary Janzen responded by asking if there was already funding at WAMPO set aside for CSAP projects, or if the CSAP would have to be in place before applying for Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) implementation grants. Mr. Parasa confirmed that the intent of the CSAP is to qualify to apply for SS4A implementation grants; WAMPO, in conjunction with member jurisdictions, will put together an implementation-grant application as soon as the next Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) is released.

4. Action

A. Comprehensive Safety Action Plan Approval

Peter Mohr, WAMPO, asked the TAC to review and recommend for approval the Comprehensive Safety Action Plan (CSAP). The CSAP was developed through a 10-month process and was available for public comment from September 19 through October 19, 2023. Three public comments were received. In addition, based on input from the public, WAMPO staff recommends that the CSAP be prefaced with a policy statement stating safety is a priority in transportation planning and the project selection process.

Discussion: Mr. Janzen asked if the TAC had seen more information or details of the CSAP at a previous meeting. Mr. Mohr shared that the CSAP has been mentioned as an agenda item in the past but due to the depth of the document (113 pages), there has not been a thorough presentation of the plan. Allison Smith stated that she would like to see a presentation prior to voting. Mr. Janzen and Jack Brown agreed.

Action: Table the Comprehensive Safety Action Plan and the Safety Policy Statement vote until the TAC meeting on November 27, 2023 (14-0).

B. Urban Area Boundary

Mr. Mohr explained that every ten years MPOs need to adopt an Urban Area Boundary (UAB) that encompasses the corresponding Census Urban Area resulting from the latest decennial U.S. Census. There are a few locations where the 2020 Wichita Census Urban Area is not entirely within the current WAMPO UAB, meaning the WAMPO UAB needs to be updated. WAMPO staff, in consultation with KDOT staff and the WAMPO TAC and TPB, have developed a proposed new UAB. Nick Flanders, WAMPO, shared the process of developing a new UAB and the steps WAMPO followed to reach the proposed UAB, including adjustments made following the October 10, 2023, TPB meeting. The TAC was asked to make a formal recommendation on the proposed new UAB to the TPB, which will consider it for approval at their November 14, 2023, meeting.

Discussion: Lynn Packer asked if the included southeast quadrant of the proposed UAB, between Derby and Rose Hill, which is not yet very developed, fits the guidelines to be considered an urban area. Mr. Flanders said that WAMPO consulted with KDOT staff who said it was acceptable to include.

C. 2024 Unified Planning Work Program Approval

Mr. Mohr and Mr. Parasa asked the TAC to make a recommendation to the TPB on the proposed 2024 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP), which is WAMPO's primary budgeting document for planning activities in 2024. The 2024 UPWP was available for public comment from September 9 through October 9, 2023; no public comments were received. Mr. Parasa shared some of the planning priorities and activities included in the proposed UPWP, noting that the budget is similar to that of the 2023 UPWP. The TAC's recommendations will be presented to the Transportation Policy Body on November 14, 2023.

5. Discussion/Updates

A. Employment Sectors

Mr. Mohr discussed how the WAMPO region is home to a diverse and vibrant economy. As a part of WAMPO's mission to serve and inform its stakeholders, staff are developing a series of reports on seven different sectors that comprise the local economy. As the second in a series of presentations, this report focused on WAMPO's Advanced Manufacturing industry. Mr. Parasa added that this data plays a role in the development of the Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP).

Discussion: Chair Kessler commended the amount of work that went into the employment sector reports.

B. Demographic and Socioeconomic Forecasts

Mr. Mohr presented that through collaboration between WAMPO staff and the Center for Economic Development and Business Research (CEDBR), an in-depth analysis of the region's demographics and socioeconomics was conducted and forecasts were created. Since population and economics drive demand on transportation infrastructure, these analyses are critical for informed planning of future transportation projects. Mr. Mohr gave further information on the extent of the demographic classifications, which are organized by ESRI Tapestry Segmentations and Life Modes, which describe specific characteristics of demographic groups. A side-by-side comparison between WAMPO and Eastborough was presented as an example. Mr. Parasa explained how this information plays into WAMPO data and plan development, sharing that it is part of the long range Metropolitan Transportation Plan.

C. Vision Zero

Maria Cantrell, Burgess & Niple, spoke on the WAMPO collaboration with Burgess & Niple (B&N) consultants and stated how WAMPO staff have developed a Comprehensive Safety Action Plan (CSAP), designed to promote the safety of all users of the transportation system. As a further extension of this collaboration, the consultants are developing a Vision Zero toolkit for the WAMPO region. Vision Zero sets forth broad goals aimed at eliminating traffic-related deaths and severe injuries. Ms. Cantrell shared numerous traffic safety statistics and explained the differences between this approach and the traditional approach to traffic safety, as well as the factors that play a role in the application of Vision Zero.

Discussion: Mr. Parasa gave more context on Vision Zero, saying that the City of Wichita and the City of Derby have each had the goal of developing a Vision Zero framework that could set an example for various other cities. Gary Janzen asked if there is data available from other cities showing which countermeasures are most effective. Ms. Cantrell replied that cities can participate in organizations like the National Association of City Transportation Officials (NACTO), which is a great resource for asking specific questions, and that cities also share data showing the countermeasures that were most effective for them.

Executive Summary

A combined Call for Projects for Metropolitan Transportation Plan 2050 (MTP 2050) and the FFY2025-FFY2028 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) is open from September 15, 2023, through January 5, 2024.

Background

WAMPO is in the process of developing the next Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) for the region, Metropolitan Transportation Plan 2050 (MTP 2050), due by June 2025, as well as the FFY2025-FFY2028 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), due by August 2024. Both to save member jurisdictions the trouble of submitting two separate applications and to ensure consistency between MTP 2050 and the FFY2025-FFY2028 TIP, WAMPO staff opened a combined MTP/TIP Call for Projects on September 15, 2023, which will run through **January 5, 2024**. All member jurisdictions should have received a detailed application packet specifying all the information they must provide in order for WAMPO to prioritize projects both for inclusion in the MTP and TIP and for receiving WAMPO-suballocated Federal funding. The application packet may also be downloaded from www.wampo.org/transportation-improvement-program or www.wampo.org/mtp2050.

Executive Summary

The Comprehensive Safety Action Plan (CSAP) is meant to promote the safety of all users of the transportation system. It was developed through a ten-month process and was available for public comment from September 19 through October 19, 2023. Three public comments were received. In response to input from the public, WAMPO staff have prefaced the CSAP with a policy statement that safety is a priority in transportation planning and the project selection process. Pending approval of the CSAP by the Transportation Policy Body (TPB) on December 12, 2023, the WAMPO region will be eligible to apply for Federal Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) Implementation Grants. The TAC is now asked to make a formal recommendation to the TPB on whether to adopt the CSAP.

Background

The public comment period for the Wichita Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (WAMPO) Comprehensive Safety Action Plan (CSAP) (https://www.wampo.org/safety) was open from September 19 through October 19, 2023. Three public comments were received during that period. These comments, as shown in the attached public comments document, were taken into consideration by WAMPO staff and their project consultant, Burgess & Niple (B&N) (with subconsultants TranSystems and Vireo). These comments will be included in the final CSAP plan.

Previous public engagement activities revealed the public's clear preference for prioritizing safety. To this end, WAMPO staff have prefaced the CSAP with a clear policy statement that safety is a priority in transportation planning and the project selection process.

WAMPO and Wichita-region communities and public agencies collaborated to develop the CSAP through a ten-month planning process. WAMPO staff and the consultant team engaged the community; reviewed existing plans, policies, and projects; conducted data analyses; applied the U.S. Department of Transportation's Safe System Approach (www.transportation.gov/NRSS/SafeSystem); and recommended specific steps the region should take to improve transportation safety for everyone. WAMPO will leverage the final plan as WAMPO staff and partners pursue funding for the recommended improvements.

Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A)

The Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) grant program Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) for this year was published earlier than expected, with grant applications due on July 10, 2023, prior to the expected adoption of the WAMPO CSAP, meaning the WAMPO region was not able to apply for any Implementation Grants during this round of funding. Instead, WAMPO staff and consultants put together a Planning and Demonstration Grant application in support of the development of the CSAP. We hope to hear if WAMPO was awarded funding in November 2023. WAMPO intends to apply for an Implementation Grant in 2024.

Executive Summary

WAMPO's annual bicycle and pedestrian counts, conducted since 2012, offer crucial insights into non-motorized travel trends in the region. The data helps inform road improvements and non-motorized transportation projects. It enhances public understanding of commuting, physical activity, and transportation interactions. Data from 35 locations in 2023, projected over time, helps predict Average Annual Daily Traffic (AADT) for cyclists and pedestrians based on national standards. WAMPO staff have compiled data, projections, and analyzed demographics to form a comprehensive report, and have developed an interactive map.

Background

Since 2012, WAMPO has conducted annual bicycle and pedestrian counts at various locations throughout the region. These counts measure non-motorized travel within the WAMPO region. This helps to determine long-term walking and biking trends as well as where emphasis should be placed by member jurisdictions in terms of road improvements, repairs, and new non-motorized transportation projects. Further, this information can also be shared with the public and government agencies and can help the community develop a more thorough understanding of how the WAMPO region commutes, stays active and interacts with the transportation system. It also sheds light on the relationships between transportation, land use, and climate by illustrating trends in road and path usage.

WAMPO Bicycle and Pedestrian Count Projections

From 2012 to 2022, bicyclists and pedestrians were counted at 42 site locations. Count sites were adjusted in 2023, and some sites removed, resulting in 35 designated count locations. Each site was counted for two hours on a Wednesday or Thursday morning, two hours on a Wednesday or Thursday evening, and two hours on a Saturday afternoon, for a total of six hours of volunteer time per count location. Data is gathered at both screenline (a line that runs along a path or road and is counted when crossed) and intersection (where passage through the intersection is counted) locations. WAMPO enlists support from approximately 70 community volunteers each year to collect this information.

This is the second year WAMPO is projecting these counts to represent larger swaths of time and traffic. Projections calculated from daily counts can be used to predict and analyze daily, weekly, monthly, and yearly volumes and averages. These counts and their methodology are based on national standards from the National Bicycle and Pedestrian Documentation Project. This methodology allows planners to predict the Average Annual Daily Traffic (AADT) for bicycle and pedestrian counts each year.

Along with the charts and maps for the 2023 bicycle and pedestrian count projections, WAMPO is developing an online interactive map that will be made accessible through the WAMPO website. The interactive map will allow for public access to past count data and current projections. All the bicycle and pedestrian count data, analysis, and projections are compiled in a comprehensive report, the WAMPO Bicycle and Pedestrian Projections Data Report 2023-2012.



Executive Summary

WAMPO maintains a Travel Demand Model (TDM) for the Wichita metropolitan area. The TDM forecasts travel demand and predicts future performance of the transportation network. To aid in the development of Metropolitan Transportation Plan 2050 (MTP 2050), WAMPO has hired the consulting firm JEO, with subcontractor Caliper, to update the WAMPO TDM and train WAMPO staff on its numerous functions and features. Completion of the model is tentatively expected by the end of November 2023, with staff training on the finished model planned for December 2023.

Background

WAMPO maintains a Travel Demand Model (TDM) for the Wichita metropolitan area. WAMPO's primary uses of the model are to forecast travel demand and to evaluate the future performance of the region's transportation network. TDMs are an integral part of long-range transportation planning, including WAMPO's Metropolitan Transportation Plan 2050 (MTP 2050), currently in development. Having a TDM also helps ensure compliance with the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) regulations. Additionally, local governments and the Kansas Department of Transportation (KDOT) can use the TDM to evaluate travel patterns and impacts on the regional transportation system (e.g., highways, other major roads, transit services) from proposed transportation and land-development projects.

The task of updating a Travel Demand Model is complex and requires highly trained specialists to implement model updates. As such, WAMPO hired the consulting firm JEO, with subcontractor Caliper, to update the WAMPO TDM and train WAMPO staff on its numerous functions and features. Completion of the model update is tentatively expected by the end of November 2023, with staff training on the finished model planned for December 2023.

Executive Summary

WAMPO is collaborating with SRF Consulting Group, Nelson\Nygaard Consulting Associates, and Shockey Consulting Services to develop a Regional Transit Implementation Plan, building on the 2018 Wichita Area Transit Feasibility Study. The plan's deliverables include, among other things, a History of Transit, Feasibility and Future Conditions Reports, Steps to Establishing a Regional Transit Authority, and an Implementation Plan.

Background

On July 11, 2023, the WAMPO Transportation Policy Body signed a contract with SRF Consulting Group, Inc., with subconsultants Nelson\Nygaard Consulting Associates, Inc. and Shockey Consulting Services, LLC, to develop a Regional Transit Implementation Plan.

The plan will build upon <u>Connecting Communities</u>: <u>Wichita Area Transit Feasibility Study</u> (2018) and will be a companion plan to the Wichita Transit Network Redesign Plan and the <u>Coordinated Public Transit - Human Services Transportation Plan</u>.

The planning process includes the following deliverables:

- » History Technical Report
- » Regional Transit Feasibility Report
- >> Future Conditions and Scenarios Report
- Steps to Establishing a Regional Transit Authority
- » Implementation Plan
- >> Development and Execution of the Plan/Agreement between Transit Providers

The following task documents have been completed and are under review by WAMPO staff.

Project Management Plan

WAMPO staff received from SRF and provided comments back to them on a Project Management Plan for the development of the Regional Transit Implementation Plan. SRF updated the Project Management Plan in response to those comments.

The Project Management Plan delineates the roles and responsibilities of each project-team member, establishing a clear framework for their contributions. It outlines the communication strategies that SRF will employ, explaining how documentation, dialogue, and collaboration will be executed with WAMPO and other relevant agencies. The plan incorporates a well-defined schedule, accompanied by a breakdown of deliverables into specific components, ensuring a systematic and transparent approach to project

management. This structured methodology not only enhances efficiency but also fosters a collaborative environment, essential for the success of the undertaking.

Community Engagement Plan

WAMPO staff have reviewed and provided comments on a Community Engagement Plan for the development of the Regional Transit Implementation Plan.

History Technical Report

A report on the history of public transit in the WAMPO region was developed as part of the Regional Transit Implementation Plan in 2023. WAMPO staff have reviewed and provided comments on the History of Transit in the WAMPO Region report. SRF is currently working on filling in information gaps.

The report offers a brief overview of the public transit agencies operating in and around WAMPO's planning area. Following a transit-provider overview, the report includes a timeline of major transit-related events in the WAMPO region. The intent is to provide both a snapshot of existing services and an understanding of previous decisions made in the region. It will help to inform further discussion on potential governance structures and coordinated regional transit provision.

The report describes the current operating status and, where applicable, the history of each public transit provider operating in the WAMPO region:

- » Wichita Transit
- » County-Run Services
 - Butler County Transit
 - Sedgwick County Transportation
- » Small City-Run Services
 - o Derby Dash
 - o Haysville Hustle
- » Senior Centers
 - Mulvane Senior Center
 - Park City Senior Center

The level of detail provided about each transit service provider reflects its characteristics and the data it collects and retains. For instance, the Park City Senior Center's transportation service is relatively new and has been entirely locally funded. Thus, there is not a long history of events in Park City, and the level of detail in its operating and funding data is not the same as larger providers. The mix of agencies is diverse in size and structure; as a result, there is corresponding variation in the detail level of the descriptions.




