2. Regular Business

C. Director's Report

- i. Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) Update Chad presented an overview of MTP and TIP cycles. This cycle of the MTP wraps up in June of 2020, and the new cycle begins immediately to prepare for the next cycle due in June 2025. Chad reported that WAMPO will be working on forming upcoming committees to prepare for the next MTP. These committees include: Safety committee, Freight committee, Infrastructure committee, and Regional Bike/Ped/Trails committee. Please feel free to contact Chad for any additional info.
- ii. **Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) Update** Chad mentioned that the development of the TIP is on schedule. The TAC and TPB are scheduled to take action on the TIP 2021-2014 final document in May and June. Next TIP 2023-2026 document will be due in two years i.e., year 2022.
- iii. **Bicycle/Pedestrian Count** Chad reminded the board of our Bike/Ped Count later in the year. He requested to help spread the word that we need volunteers in September for Bike/Ped Counting.
- iv. **APBP Webinar** C. Parasa let the board know that the upcoming webinar: 2020 Vision through the Lens of Equity would be available after May 20, 2020 to all who request. Also coming up is the June webinar: Measuring the Pedestrian Environment, on June 17, 2020.
- 3. Public Comment Opportunity Alan Kailer of Bike Walk Wichita thanked the WAMPO staff, the TAC and the TPB for their support of pedestrian related projects in the Wichita area, and he urged them to continue this support. Included in the packet was a letter reflecting his appreciation.

4. New Business Items

A. Action: REIMAGINED MOVE 2040 Document and Appendices, Chris Upchurch, Principal Planner, WAMPO

Discussion: For more than two years, WAMPO has been working on an update to our Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP). The process of updating our MTP is finally coming to a close. The core MTP document, Reimagined MOVE 2040, is out for review by members of this committee, stakeholder groups, and members of the public.

Staff have worked hard to make the MTP document shorter and more readable, including lots of graphics and moving some of the technical and regulatory content to an extensive series of appendices. I hope that this will make the new MTP a document that is actually useful to the public, rather than only being of interest to our state and federal regulators.

We would like to ask two things of the policy body: First that you review the MTP document and provide any feedback. Second, get the word out. Please pass this on to your jurisdictions and to other stakeholder groups. We want to get it out there as broadly as possible.

B. Action: 2019 – 2022 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) Amendment #6, Kristen Zimmerman, Senior Planner, WAMPO

Discussion: WAMPO's Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) is an on-going program that assigns funding to specific highway, road, bridge, transit, bicycle, pedestrian, and other transportation projects in the region. Inclusion in the TIP is federally required before any federal funds can be made available for use on a project.

The current TIP covers projects that are expected to be active during Federal Fiscal Years (FFY) 2019 thru 2022; it includes 110 projects, totaling \$958 million in estimated cost. The complete project list and additional project information can be found on WAMPO's website.

Regular opportunities are provided to project sponsors to request changes during the project development process. Requests for new projects or requests for significant changes to scope or cost are considered as formal Amendments and require formal approval by the WAMPO Transportation Policy Body (TPB). Smaller, administrative changes* are processed by staff.

Amendment #6 requests for changes were accepted for 15 projects. Of these,

- 8 will require formal action
- 7 were administrative changes (which include activities like small adjustments in the cost estimate or schedule)

Jack Brown asked for information regarding which projects included Bicycle/Pedestrian Facilities. Kristen said she was going to check on this and following the meeting sent this email: "I double-checked and confirmed that the Bel Aire project on Woodlawn will include a 10' multiuse path, and the Park City project on 61st St will include "pedestrian/bicycle" facilities. According to our records, the Derby project on Patriot/K-15 will not have any bike features. It is the addition of a right turn lane from 63rd to K-15."

C. Action: 2021 – 2024 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), Kristen Zimmerman, Senior Planner, WAMPO

Discussion: The Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) is an on-going program of priority, agreed-upon projects, programs, and initiatives that the greater Wichita region has committed to take place in the near future. The projects in the TIP help to implement WAMPO's Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP), REIMAGINED MOVE 2040, which defines the vision for the region's transportation system.

The TIP programs, or assigns, funding to specific highway, road, bridge, transit, bicycle, pedestrian, and other transportation projects. It includes all WAMPO funded projects, as well as other projects that are managed by, or awarded by, KDOT or Wichita Transit when federal transportation funding is used on these projects, or if they are regionally significant projects in our region. Federally funded projects are required to be included in the TIP in order to access the federal funding.

The TIP is an on-going program, and the current TIP covers projects that are expected to take place during Federal Fiscal Years 2019 thru 2022. It was updated this year to cover federal fiscal years 2021 - 2024. The 2021 - 2024 TIP implements 15% of the REIMAGINED MOVE 2040 Plan.

Agenda Item 4A: Update Item The Future of Transportation Final Report WSU Public Policy & Management Center

Background:

In early 2020 WAMPO enlisted the aid of the Public Policy and Management Center (PPMC) at Wichita State University to assess future of transportation technologies, by developing a public engagement initiative focused on the future of transportation technologies, with particular attention paid to technological advancements and opportunities.

Special efforts were be made to engage multi-generations and underrepresented populations in existing transportation systems, such as low-income households, minorities, individuals with limited English proficiency, individuals with a disability, older adults and households without a motor vehicle. The intent of these activities was to share the research on transportation issues of the future, as well as gather input on implications, anticipated issues and overall impact for transportation needs in the future.

The Study:

The three main tasks associated with the "Future of Transportation Technologies" study included:

- 1) Developing tools to capture perceptions of Future of Transportation Technologies. Literature review of emerging technologies in transportation.
- 2) Developing an engagement strategy and timeline highlighting the activities, methods, roles and responsibilities;
- Assisting with the development and execution of an inclusive regional survey and stakeholder engagement process that would inform WAMPO of infrastructure and mode choice preferences/perceptions organized by the generational categories;
- 4) Analysis and interpretation of data including lessons learned and opportunities for maintaining public relationships.

The Findings:

While transit dominated the regional conversation in the focus groups, researchers found widespread support for enhancements and investment in a variety of areas including "future proofing" the region. Regional sentiments indicated that before individuals would be willing to part with motor vehicles and accept alternative modes of transportation, the impetus for change would need to be momentous and would probably include a convergence of forces. Despite this, the overall support for incremental investments in technological advances like 5G were supported, with other emerging issues that included accessibility, safety, public health, and active transportation.
